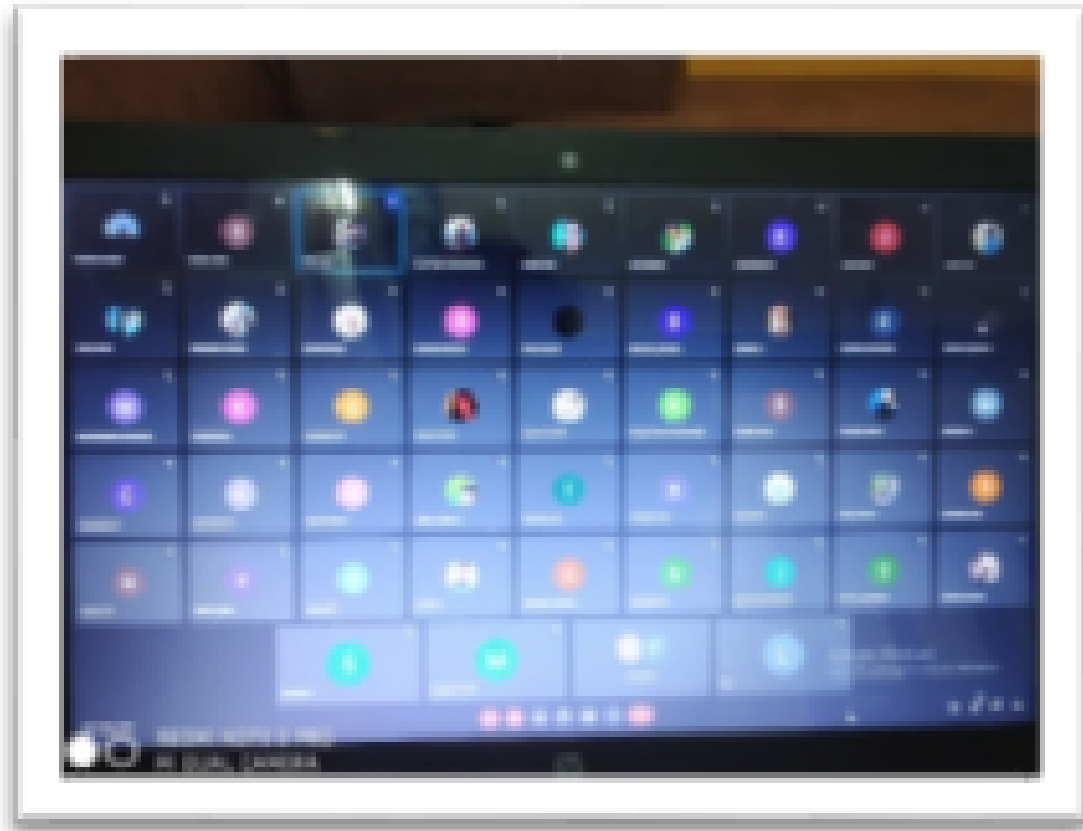
# Being educated is not enough, **SKILLS** matter !

India has a biggest population and expected to reach 1.48 billion by 2030. Indians largely contribute to the global workforce. with working-age population (15-59) likely to swell from 749 million to 962 million over 2010 to 2030. But in India around 40% of people live on less than US\$1.25 a day. Low levels of education and skills of youth have resulted in their inability to access the opportunities offered by emerging markets.

Urban poverty being multi-dimensional, various vulnerabilities faced by the poor in cities and towns, that is (residential, occupational, and social) which need to be addressed. India's transition to one of the largest and fastest growing global economies during the last decade has been a remarkable phenomenon. But still the labour market continues to struggle to find skilled talent. In order for India to sustain and accelerate its growth trajectory, an environment for sustained and continuous skill development of its workforce to address the employability gap has become a critical imperative.

To bridge this demand supply gap SAMA FOUNDATION is imparting employable Skills to vulnerable and marginalized individuals in the slums of Bangalore. In this regard we have collaborated & Partnership with Quest Alliance since August 2016 and together implementing "My Quest" programs to building among underprivileged youths from urban slums communities in Bengaluru.

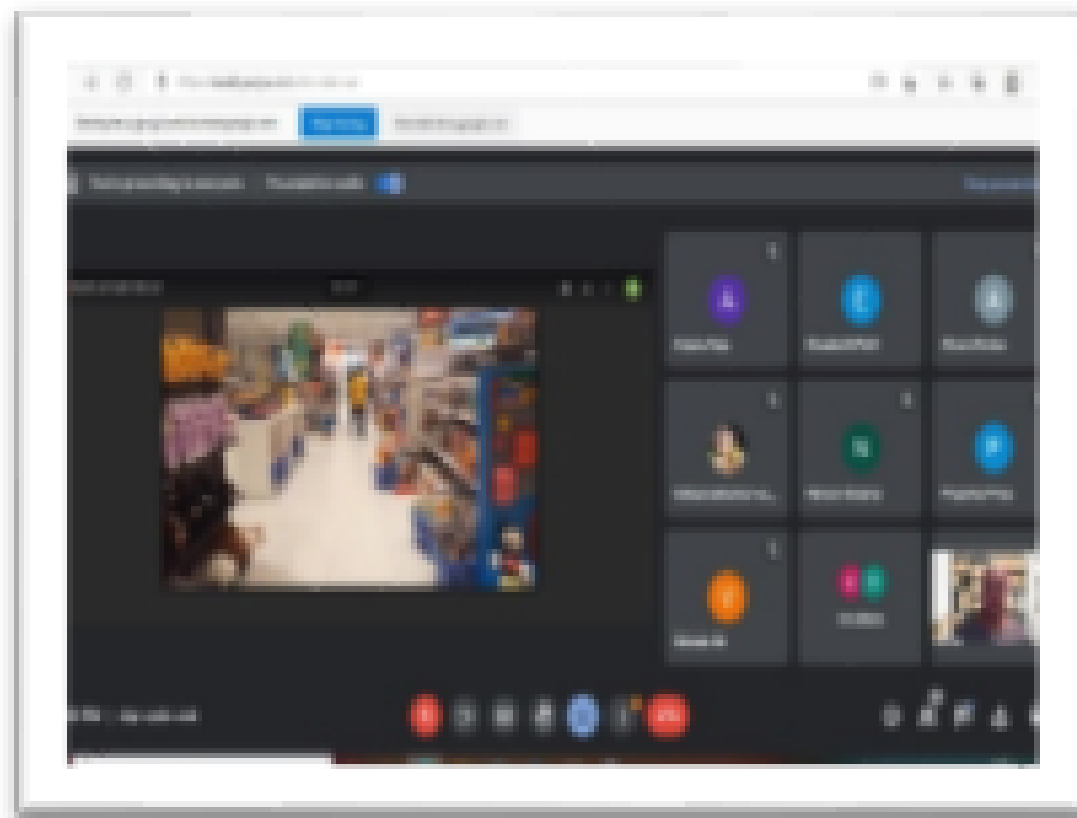

## Covid-19 Relief work :

Challenges faced during the project period:

- Due to covid-19 pandemic we are able to reach all the children with disability and also conduct activities in schools as we all not able to identify girl children.
- Many of families was not allow us visit during lockdown.
- Some of families we not able to trace due to they are migrated to native place due to lockdown.
- Many of parents with sever children with disability are not willing send their children to center due to cost of travel not afford and parents are lost their jobs and income was go down.



## Overall outcome of the project:

- 20 children were able write and alphabet, 2 and 3 words and write sentences after teaching writing skill.
- Increased mobility (started walking with support) in children due to our regular physiotherapy intervention.
- The children with disabilities and their parents are following Covid'19 norms and protocol like wearing mask, frequently washing their hand and maintain social distance and also parents are sensitization on the same to their neighbours and others whoever visited their home.
- Increases ADL skills like folding small size cloth, holding the spoon & things, brushing, eating the foods and removing a shirt button for 14 children with severe disability.
- Increased academic learning in 27 children with severe disabilities like colouring, scribbling and sharing some words.
- Increased communication skills like telling the stories, communication to their peers and teachers among 30 children with severe disabilities.
- 30 children were able identify their teachers and friends.
- We have done one child mainstream to government school from 3 children with disability joined to Government school. Among 1 child Nagasandra Govt. school, Second and third children joined to chikkabidrukallu Govt. School.

# Community Health is Vital

The community health Responses Project, supported by Azim Premji Foundation, aimed in reducing social stigma associated with COVID-19 and in providing emergency relief and support to people who were affected & infected by Covid-19.

By end of march 2022,

- We covered 53 areas/slums from 8 wards
- Helped around 30000+ families
- Got vaccination for around 86000+ people

We Did:

- Baseline Survey
- Covid Tests
- Vaccination
- Referrals to PHCs

## Impact of Baseline Survey

- With the help of Baseline survey it was able to find the high risk people in the community.
- Regular follow-up of the High risk people.
- It helped to build a good rapport with the community people.
- It helped to find the details of socio economic status of the family



## Impact of testing 60000+ people



- It helped to reduce the positivity rate in the community.
- It helped to reduce the death rate due to Covid because of early detection.
- It helped to find the primary and secondary contact in the community to stop the spreading rate

## Impact of Vaccination

- It helped to reduce the hospital admission rate in the community.
- It helped to reduce the death rate to Nil compared to death rate during 2nd wave due to Covid.
- The cases increased more during 3rd wave compared to 1st and 2nd wave in our working community but hospitalisation and death was nil.



## Impact of Referrals to PHC and Baptist community centre at DJ Halli



- Referral helped the community people to know about the benefits provided in the government hospitals and the facilities available in the local PHC.
- It helped the community people to obtain the basic benefits like Sugar/BP testing and availing free medicines and other health issues like TB, Pregnant and Lactating women regular check up and immunisation to children especially during many benefitted with the above treatments which was lacking due to financial burdens because of lockdown imposed due to pandemic and the Covid testing/ referral to bed booking if tested positive and Covid vaccination helped the community people a lot.
- The Baptist community centre at DJ halli benefits the local community to obtain better health benefits through a registration fee of 20 Rs according to their economic status and obtain the medical benefits at a discounted rate at Baptist hospital.
